### **Introduction:**

The Journey of Hislop College began as a school, founded by Rev. Stephen Hislop on May 2, 1846. It was the first time that education was being offered to those who desired it but could not afford it. Hislop, now has grown in the vision and legacy of its founder into a premier college, providing quality Higher education and serving the community, since 1883. The beginning has given a distinctive ethical crusading characteristic to our institution and we focus to maintain it that way. One of the distinctive characteristics of Hislop is providing quality and affordable education to students from rural areas, from low-income families, and from all castes and religious beliefs. We strive for equity towards all our students and strive to provide them the best education that they deserve and that they can afford.

#### **The Context:**

Being a co-ed, multi faculty, multi lingual and centrally located college, students with various socioeconomic backgrounds and underprivileged sections seek admission to Hislop. A significant number of students admitted to the college belong to open category with a weaker financial background. Amongst these, a good number of students are not eligible for Government free ship and scholarship.

The College has an inclusive admission process where care is taken to ensure that seats are allotted to students who are sports persons or who belong to economically and socially disadvantaged section of the society. College takes the responsibility of supporting such needy students by providing them financial assistance. The aim is to make them self-confident and self-reliant. The institution lays its focus to provide financial aid to its learner not only by facilitating for various scholarships & freeships of the government but also offer institutional scholarships viz.

**Evidence:**

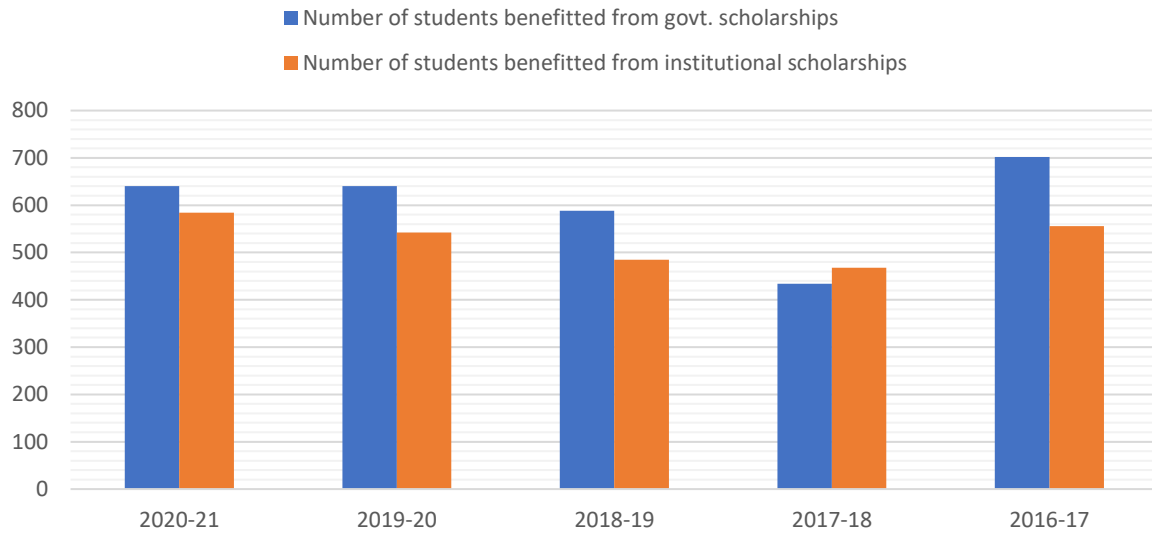
The institution over the years has empowered huge number of students from socially and economically challenged backgrounds. The distinctiveness of the philosophy is evident from the positive impact it has on the students' lives. **'Education for all: An inclusive philosophy'** has contributed to social inclusion and nation building at large.

A total of 26.22% students have benefitted through financial assistance schemes. Out of this 13.97% of students have benefited from government scholarships and freeships, while 12.25 % of students have benefited from institutional scholarships to the tune of Rs. **3,22,65,597/-** during the current assessment cycle.
